

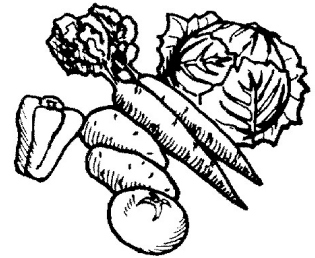

Notes from the Farm

Well, folks, it's over. As certainly as the shadows lengthen and the trees change, the season is winding down. This has been a challenging season, as I know you've all heard me say over and over, in writing and in person, over the last five months. The weather played tricks on us all year long. At one point it was so dry that Alex literally got one of our tractors stuck in the dust in the field. At another, the same tractor sank up to its axles in the mud. The wild storms of May and the incredible heat of July and August are all past us now, giving way to the inexplicable sense of optimism that I feel every October when the weather changes and the growing season draws to a close. Sure, I'll do it again next year—that wasn't so bad after all!

The truth is, though, that it has been a very positive season for our farm in many of the truly important ways—our farm crew was dedicated and hardworking and inspiring to be around (and we still like each other, too); our volunteers were kind and committed and put up with us even at our most despondent, bringing food to share and topics of conversation to distract us from our worries; and the land remained healthy and productive, evident even as it grows cover crops this time of year.

And we had your support for the work that we do. As Trina said the other day at our Third Sunday gathering, it is incredible for us as farmers to have a group of people who, like all of you, recognize that taking the courageous step of sharing the risk of a growing season with the farm is a step in the right direction in our very confused agricultural society. This year may have tested your faith in farming—there were definitely times during the season when it has tested ours.

And the reality is, you have all become true shareholders in our farm this season, taking the

risk even when the result, from what Matthew calls the 'capitalist' perspective, may not show a 15% or a 20% or even a 10% return on your original investment. This is the seemingly counterintuitive (and therefore, inherently faithful) kind of act that *does* make a difference in the world. The truth is that, as many of you who have been shareholders for years know, to become truly engaged with community supported agriculture takes a multi-year experience. Most years are great, some are truly challenging, and *all* of those years are part of our shared long-term commitment to doing agriculture, being part of the agricultural process, and re-connecting the nourishment of our families directly to the health of the land, along with the families in need who eat our donated produce.

Over the past few weeks, things have been so busy in our little organization that it has been difficult for all of us to step back far enough to think about our larger mission, the work that excited us all so much that we were willing to commit much of our time and energy to it. And that, for me, is it—it's the re-building of relationships that have been lost, between people of all means and their food and the land. We do it on a very small scale, with very great love. That is really what it's all about, and that is what you continue to enable us to do with your membership in our farm. You can't write that in a mission statement, but you can say it with gratitude in a CSA newsletter.

Thank you, thank you, thank you. See you in the spring.
