As Waltham Fields Community Farm has grown and changed over many years, the heart of our mission - providing food access, farm education, community service, and responsible land management - has been the roots that keep us grounded. 2015 has been no exception with over \$90,000 in food assistance distributions, record-breaking education participants in our Learning Garden, extensive community collaborations, and engaging public events, both on and off the farm. Amidst this solid contribution to our rooted mission, Waltham Fields has seen great changes this year that spark reflection, evaluation and continued growth for the entire organization.

At the end of November, we said goodbye to long-time Executive Director Claire Kozower, who has moved on to pursue her passion of farmland preservation on a larger scale. Claire worked tirelessly in growing our nonprofit's efforts to meet the food access needs of the greater community, improving education and volunteer program services, advancing regional farmland preservation and farmer training, and building an organized and wonderful work culture - not to mention a dedicated staff who are proud of the work they accomplish together. Throughout 2015 we also worked on continued growth of our Education Programs - expanding the number of Learning Garden programs in spring, summer and fall, increasing work hours for our Youth Crew, a first time job experience for teens and graduating another Assistant Grower, who successfully completed our two-year Farmer Training program. These education experiences illustrate our dedication to advancing organic agriculture, economic opportunity, and community health with all ages in our community. Thank you for your own efforts and support that allow Waltham Fields to grow, while staying rooted in our mission.

- We surpassed \$98,000 in value for Food Access, harvesting over 39,000 pounds of fresh, organically-grown produce for low-income households and assistance programs.
- We offered more education programming than ever before in our Learning Garden and ended the year with a record-breaking 1,000 visitors!
- Success in our Farmer Training program with former Farm Manager, Zannah, hired as Farm Manager of Powisett Farm in Dover.
- Received a \$40,000 capital grant from the Doe Foundation to purchase a new farm truck and trailer.

## FINANCIAL STATUS

We began and ended 2015 in good financial standing, making annual contributions to our reserve accounts for capital purchases, employee leave, and emergencies. Our net operating surplus was \$62,950.

We are pleased to continue working with accountant John M. Monticone, CPA, of Medford, MA, who will complete an audited review in accordance with nonprofit accounting regulations and adjust for non-cash expense items (such as depreciation) at that time. ## Farm Production Overview

We found ourselves calling 2015 a “mixed bag” over and over again. We waited until mid-April for the winter snows to melt and the fields to dry out. And dry out they did. Save for a few storms in June, we had very little precipitation throughout the growing months. This was a blessing for keeping certain moisture-loving diseases at bay (late blight in tomatoes!) but a detriment to germination and growing of summer-seeded winter roots, namely turnips, sweet potatoes, rutabaga and parsnips. Seasoned CSA shareholders know that the diversity and quantity of the crop selection on the stand varies from season to season, despite the fact that our crop plan looks similar on paper from year to year and 2015 was no different. All in all, we didn’t experience a bumper crop with any planting in particular, though many produced as expected. Potatoes and eggplant were hit hard by the strong emergence of the Colorado potato beetle at our Gateways field, and our measures to control them couldn’t quite keep up with the population growth. The hot and dry weather led lettuce plantings to bolt and become unpalatable earlier than normal; we managed to keep a fairly steady supply in the CSA shares but saw a slight reduction in our final donation tally. Our summer CSA provided a 15% return to shareholders, without accounting for pick-your-own crops, and winter shares provided a strong return as well, thanks to a mild fall that accommodated multiple pickings of high value greens.

In 2015, we continued a successful partnership with Picadilly Farm in supplying 100 mixed summer CSA shares, as well as summer potatoes, and with Atlas Farm, from whom we buy in fall potatoes and winter squash. The CSA partnership with Picadilly helps buffer some of our own crop disappointments and they were able to provide a showing of cantaloupe, parsnips, rutabaga and celeriac for our summer shareholders. We’re thankful for these partnerships and talented farmers.

Our field equipment remained fairly static through the bulk of the season, but we increased our road vehicle fleet through the donation of a minivan and the grant-funded purchase of a new farm truck. Both will increase the efficiency and reliability of the transportation of our farm crew and our veggies. The purchase of a new water wheel transplanter, funded by the James Underwood Crockett Agricultural Technology Growth Fund, came late in the season and will be an asset to 2016.

\*Our own harvests account for the large majority of our agricultural revenue, with 11% of our CSA value obtained through share partnerships with other farms. Half-priced CSA revenue for low-income households (\$7,400) is included with Food Access revenue (see \*\*).

\*\*Most of the value of produce distributed through our food access programs is fundraised for and provided for free, but a small amount of income is made by offering produce at subsidized prices through our farm-to-school partnerships, Half-priced CSA shares, and Outreach Market, where low-income customers that don't have vouchers can pay \$5/bag with cash or SNAP/EBT.

## FOOD ACCESS PROGRAMS

Waltham Fields Community Farm remains committed to ensuring that all people in our community, regardless of income, have access to fresh organic vegetables.

**Bulk Donations:** The top four crops for donation in 2015 (by weight) were lettuce (4,343 pounds), carrots (3,673 pounds), collards (3,591 pounds), and summer squash (3,528 pounds). Throughout the season, we made weekly donations to our long-standing partner, Food for Free. Donations of larger, bulk harvests were made to Greater Boston Food Bank and the Boston Area Gleaners, who helped with a late autumn final harvest of our collards. The majority of the donated produce went to residents and meal programs in Boston, Cambridge, and Somerville, with smaller quantities distributed throughout the larger Greater Boston region.

**Waltham Fields Outreach Market:** Our Outreach Market for low-income families and individuals distributed \$34,581 worth of produce in 2015. This is a decrease over last year's value due to the extraordinary 2014 growing season. Overall, 71% of weekly produce allotments were paid \$5 for, 24.5% was through redemption of vouchers we provide to local social service agencies for distribution to their clientele, and 4.5% was purchased as \$5 SNAP/Food Stamps benefits payments. The average value per allotment of produce per week was \$34.23. Of the total \$34K in value distributed, we brought in just under \$4K in revenue from the \$5 cash and SNAP purchases.

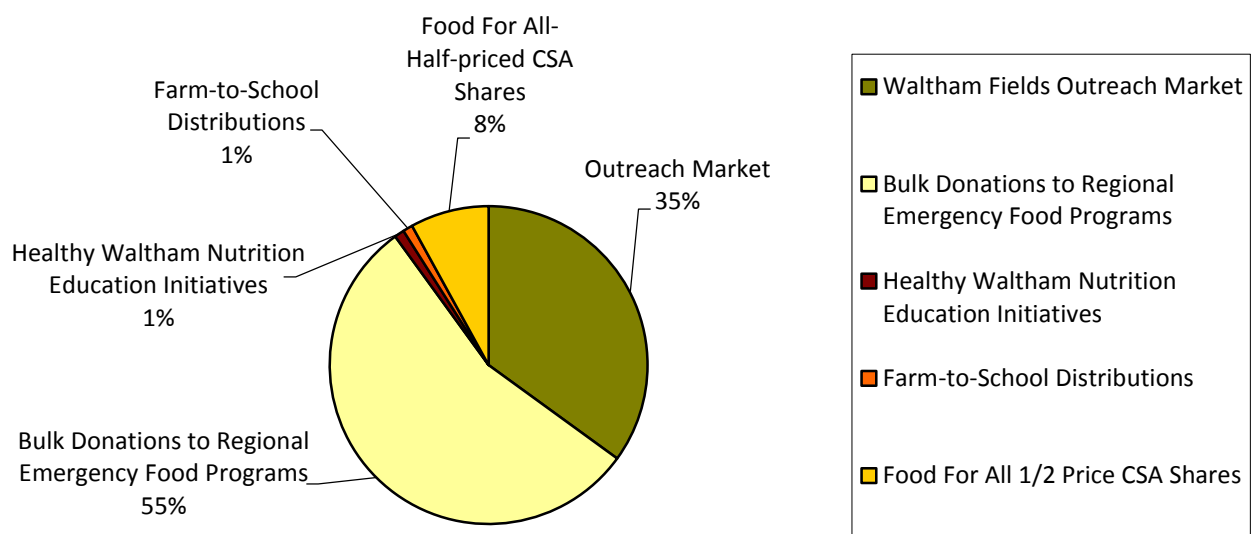
**Food for All – Half-priced Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) Shares:** For the first time, WFCF met its goal of providing 20 subsidized Food for All CSA summer shares. Due to participant inquiry and generous donors, we were unexpectedly able to supply 4 Food for All winter shares.

**Farm-to-School Distributions:** WFCF provided the Waltham Public School cafeterias with the Massachusetts Farm to School Project's featured vegetable for four months in 2015, featuring zucchini and summer squash, lettuce, kale and carrots.

**Healthy Waltham Nutrition Education Initiatives:** Collaborations with Healthy Waltham continued, with produce from our farm supplying after-school and summer cooking/nutrition education programs, and special holiday meals for the Waltham Family School and other low-income community groups.

## EDUCATION & OUTREACH

**Learning Garden Programs & Public Outreach:** We reached a total of 1,696 people (1000 children and 696 adults) this season through a range of free and tuition-based on-farm education programs – the most children we’ve ever had on the farm! Our programs included three seasons of youth and family programming, adult workshops, on-farm events and a handful of off-farm initiatives as well, such as participating on speaker panels and holding activity tables at community events. Our own free annual Farm Day festival - a celebration of local agriculture and the Massachusetts Harvest for Students Week - was a big success, with numerous collaborating organizations and businesses and approximately 400 people enjoying hands-on farm activities, food samples, art projects and live music.

Our tuition-based Learning Garden programs brought in earned income of \$25,069 and reached 955 children through after-school programs, summer sessions, and farm visit opportunities for school and community groups. Of this amount, 258 participants received either a reduction in fees or attended for free, amounting to \$1,679 worth of scholarship assistance to ensure that no one was turned away due to lack of ability to pay.



### **Service Learning/Volunteering:**

We are always very appreciative of the number of people who make the time to come out to help, and for the local corporations who support volunteerism in this way. This year we hosted 673 volunteers, who put in 2,000 hours helping in the fields, the office, or with event coordination. Over three dozen community-based and corporate groups contributed time in the greenhouses and fields, and our drop-in hours on Fridays and Saturdays were popular with individuals, many of whom were repeat regulars. We held two “Crop Mob” volunteer mornings for the second year, to encourage more people to help during critical weeding times, with refreshments served afterwards. Everyone really enjoys “mobbing the fields” and we have decided to make them an annual event. Our

Volunteer of the Year, honored at the Annual Meeting in November, went to the father and son team of Jim and Evan Cuthbertson, who put in many hours during drop-in times over the course of the season.

**Youth Crew Jobs Initiative:** This year, Youth Crew was extended to three long days per week, including rotating hours at the CSA and Outreach Market. Of our seven program participants, two of them were returning from last year’s crew, three members were from Waltham and five members were low-income. In addition to providing early work experiences, the Youth Crew program included education on food production, food justice, environmental science and nutrition. Youth Crew ended its season with a short presentation at the Harvest Potluck/Annual Meeting, where the students did a fantastic job preparing their presentation, and speaking about their most meaningful memories in Youth Crew.

**Farmer Training:** The end of 2015 was bittersweet as Farm Manager, Zannah Porter accepted the Farm Manager position at Powisett Farm in Dover, MA. After two years in our farmer training program and then another two years in farm management at WFCF, Zannah has proven the success of the education and field training we provide, building and developing the next generation of farmers. Anna Kelchlin has completed her second year of the program and is looking forward to continuing her progress at WFCF. Our regional work continues with Eastern Massachusetts Collaborative Regional Alliance for Farmer Training (eMassCRAFT), and partnership programming with UMass Extension under the United States Department of Agriculture’s Risk Management Agency’s Targeted States grant initiative.
